And do not say, 'Three'; desist - it is better for you. Indeed, Allah is but one God. Exalted is He above having a son." This is followed by the Caliph's own affirmation: "Praise be to Allah who has not taken a son and has had no partner in [His dominion] and has had no protector out of weakness; and declare His [greatness] as the greatest." This personal affirmation by the ruler further solidifies the political and religious intent behind the monument.

The Western and Eastern Inscriptions: Complementary Narratives
