MOVEMENT II: LARGO

THE SECOND MOVEMENT, LARGO, IS PERHAPS THE MOST FAMOUS AND BELOVED PART OF THE SYMPHONY. IT FEATURES A HAUNTINGLY BEAUTIFUL ENGLISH HORN MELODY, DEEPLY INFLUENCED BY AFRICAN AMERICAN SPIRITUALS. THE MOVEMENT ALSO INCLUDES A CONTRASTING, MORE ENERGETIC SECTION THAT BUILDS IN INTENSITY BEFORE RETURNING TO THE SERENE OPENING THEME.

MOVEMENT III: SCHERZO: MOLTO VIVACE

THE THIRD MOVEMENT, A VIBRANT SCHERZO (MOLTO VIVACE), IS A LIVELY AND ENERGETIC AFFAIR. ITS RHYTHMIC DRIVE AND FOLK-LIKE CHARACTER ARE UNDENIABLE, REMINISCENT OF A SPIRITED DANCE. MOVEMENT IV: ALLEGRO CON FUOCO

THE SYMPHONY CULMINATES IN A POWERFUL AND DRAMATIC FINALE, ALLEGRO CON FUOCO. THIS MOVEMENT IS A GRAND STATEMENT, FILLED WITH A SENSE OF TRIUMPH AND RESOLUTION. THE THEMES ARE BOLD AND HEROIC, WITH DRIVING RHYTHMS AND SWEEPING MELODIC LINES. AFRICAN AMERICAN SPIRITUALS AND THEIR EMOTIONAL RESONANCE

THE ENDURING LEGACY OF THE "FROM THE NEW WORLD" SYMPHONY
