#### 3. *THE MIXED-UP CHAMELEON* BY ERIC CARLE

THIS STORY FOLLOWS A CHAMELEON WHO WISHES TO BE LIKE OTHER ANIMALS AND CHANGES HIS APPEARANCE REPEATEDLY. 8. *STRICTLY NO ELEPHANTS* BY LISA MANTCHEV

A YOUNG BOY AND HIS PET ELEPHANT ARE EXCLUDED FROM A PET CLUB BUT CREATE THEIR OWN INCLUSIVE CLUB INSTEAD.
