While an ancient text and not directly about evangelicals, Montesquieu's foundational work on political thought and the separation of powers offers principles that are essential for any healthy intellectual tradition, including religious ones. Engaging with ideas like the rule of law, the importance of reasoned deliberation, and the dangers of unchecked power provides a benchmark against which the intellectual health of any group can be assessed. Its inclusion suggests the need for evangelicals to draw upon broader intellectual traditions for robust thinking.
