And as our major political objective is to find the cause of this war that is raging in our Black Community and we will seek to eliminate these causes, so that we may with our brothers and sisters of the oppressed communities all over the world, become united and liberate all people from the political, economic, and racial oppression of racist America.

This program was not merely a list of demands; it was a powerful statement of self-worth and a call to action that galvanized support and inspired

countless individuals.

Key Figures and Leadership
