INTERDISCIPLINARY CONNECTIONS

EARLY INFLUENCES AND PIONEERS

SCHNAIBERG'S "TREADMILL OF PRODUCTION" THEORY DESCRIBED HOW ECONOMIC GROWTH AND INDUSTRIAL EXPANSION DRIVE CONTINUOUS RESOURCE EXPLOITATION AND POLLUTION. DUNLAP CONTRIBUTED SIGNIFICANTLY TO THE CONCEPTUALIZATION OF ENVIRONMENTAL SOCIOLOGY AND ENVIRONMENTALISM AS SOCIAL MOVEMENTS.
