UNIT 1: TECHNOLOGICAL AND ENVIRONMENTAL TRANSFORMATIONS (TO C. 600 BCE)

UNIT 1 OF THE AP WORLD HISTORY CURRICULUM FOCUSES ON THE EARLIEST PERIODS OF HUMAN HISTORY, EMPHASIZING THE TRANSITION FROM HUNTER-GATHERER SOCIETIES TO AGRICULTURAL CIVILIZATIONS. ORIGINS OF HUMANKIND AND EARLY HUMAN SOCIETIES

THEIR NOMADIC LIFESTYLE REQUIRED ADAPTATION TO VARIOUS ENVIRONMENTS, WHICH SHAPED CULTURAL AND SOCIAL STRUCTURES.

THE NEOLITHIC REVOLUTION AND AGRICULTURAL DEVELOPMENT

THE NEOLITHIC REVOLUTION, OCCURRING AROUND 10,000 BCE, MARKS THE SIGNIFICANT SHIFT FROM FORAGING TO FOOD PRODUCTION. HUMANS BEGAN DOMESTICATING PLANTS AND ANIMALS, LEADING TO PERMANENT SETTLEMENTS AND POPULATION GROWTH. THIS PERIOD ALSO SAW TECHNOLOGICAL INNOVATIONS SUCH AS POTTERY, WEAVING, AND THE USE OF POLISHED STONE TOOLS.

EARLY RIVER VALLEY CIVILIZATIONS

THE RISE OF EARLY CIVILIZATIONS TOOK PLACE IN FERTILE RIVER VALLEYS, WHICH PROVIDED RESOURCES FOR AGRICULTURE AND TRADE. KEY RIVER VALLEY CIVILIZATIONS INCLUDE MESOPOTAMIA ALONG THE TIGRIS AND EUPHRATES, ANCIENT EGYPT ON THE NILE, THE INDUS VALLEY CIVILIZATION, AND EARLY CHINESE SOCIETIES ALONG THE YELLOW RIVER. THESE CIVILIZATIONS DEVELOPED COMPLEX SOCIAL HIERARCHIES, CENTRALIZED GOVERNMENTS, WRITING SYSTEMS, AND MONUMENTAL ARCHITECTURE.

KEY CHARACTERISTICS OF EARLY CIVILIZATIONS

EARLY CIVILIZATIONS SHARED SEVERAL CORE FEATURES THAT DISTINGUISHED THEM FROM PREVIOUS SOCIETIES. THESE INCLUDE:

UNIT 2: ORGANIZATION AND REORGANIZATION OF HUMAN SOCIETIES (c. 600 BCE TO c. 600 CE)

UNIT 2 FOCUSES ON THE CLASSICAL PERIOD, A TIME OF SIGNIFICANT POLITICAL, CULTURAL, AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT ACROSS THE WORLD'S MAJOR CIVILIZATIONS. CLASSICAL EMPIRES AND POLITICAL STRUCTURES

THE CLASSICAL ERA IS DEFINED BY THE EMERGENCE OF LARGE EMPIRES WITH SOPHISTICATED GOVERNANCE SYSTEMS. SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENTS

DURING THIS PERIOD, SOCIAL HIERARCHIES BECAME MORE RIGID, OFTEN SUPPORTED BY RELIGIOUS OR PHILOSOPHICAL JUSTIFICATIONS. ECONOMICALLY, THE EXPANSION OF TRADE ROUTES SUCH AS THE SILK ROAD AND INDIAN OCEAN NETWORKS FACILITATED THE EXCHANGE OF GOODS, IDEAS, AND TECHNOLOGIES. AGRICULTURE REMAINED THE ECONOMIC FOUNDATION, BUT URBANIZATION INCREASED, LEADING TO THE GROWTH OF CITIES AND SPECIALIZED LABOR.

RELIGIOUS AND CULTURAL TRADITIONS

CLASSICAL CIVILIZATIONS SAW THE DEVELOPMENT AND SPREAD OF MAJOR WORLD RELIGIONS AND PHILOSOPHIES, INCLUDING CONFUCIANISM, DAOISM, HINDUISM, BUDDHISM, JUDAISM, AND CHRISTIANITY. THESE BELIEF SYSTEMS INFLUENCED GOVERNANCE, SOCIAL NORMS, AND CULTURAL EXPRESSIONS, SHAPING IDENTITIES ACROSS REGIONS.
